

Dear Gregory Memorial, Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,



"The Lord spoke to Moses in the wilderness of Sinai, in the tent of meeting...saying, 'Take a census of the whole congregation of Israelites, in their clans, by their ancestral homes...'" ~Numbers 1:1a, 2a

Two weeks ago I attended a quarterly meeting of an organization with which I volunteer. The organization has thirty-five or so members, and dinner was being offered to show appreciation for our efforts. When I arrived, there were maybe eight other volunteers present. A few minutes after I arrived, I was joined at my table by one of the other members who is a retired minister, and his first words to me were, literally, "Wow. I can't believe how few people are here. I sure hope more people show up!"

It struck me that the first words out of his mouth would not be a greeting, but a commentary on the level of attendance at our meeting. It reminded me that we tend to put a lot of stock in the numbers of any given organization or group, using them to determine our worth, and/or whether or not we're living into our potential. And the Church, at levels local and denominational, has been doing this for decades (most recently with some attendant handwringing). 'Is there enough to keep us going?' we ask. 'Is there enough to go around?' we wonder. 'Are we doing something wrong?' we fear.

I don't like to put too much stock in numbers. I find that they are useful tools, that they are a helpful way to make sure that our understanding of a given situation is realistic, but I also believe that the numbers themselves do not define us. The degree of meaning in our lives and relationships, the ways in which we live out the good news of the gospel...these are much more realistic and accurate ways of determining where we stand on any given day.

But this conversation with my fellow volunteer got me curious, and had me thinking about our own congregation. So, I went through the directory and did some tallying of my own, using the benchmark of those who have come even occasionally in the past year (not just on Christmas/Easter). Here's what I found:

If *EVERYONE* who has occasionally come in the past year were to come to church on the same Sunday, we would have the following:

- Attendance in worship would be 116 (we currently average 55-70).
- We would have 23 youth under the age of 21 (currently average 6-10).

The anthem would be sung with the melody of 16 voices (currently average 12).

And that's just out of the people who have occasionally come to worship over the past year! If we were to reach out into the community inviting others in, as the gospel encourages us to do, imagine where we might be then! Imagine the heights to which the Kingdom of God would be made known!

If you are reading this newsletter then you are part of the group from which I took the above census. I would suggest that we challenge ourselves to come to worship, all of us, on "Back to Church" Sunday, September 13, 11:00 am. Or come earlier for a delicious breakfast, and stick around to be spiritually fed! I think we will be pleasantly surprised at the results.

After I finished this census of people, I took my curiosity a step further, looking to our finances. Based on the current number of giving units (families or individuals), if each unit increased their giving by \$5/week, we would receive another \$9,100 in yearly offerings. Or, \$20/month from each unit would yield an annual increase of \$8,400.

Imagine the ministries that could be supported and encouraged, both within our congregation and in the larger community with those gifts!

As fascinating as these statistics are, at the end of the day they are just numbers on paper. We truly measure our meaning and worth by the faithfulness we offer to God, the discipleship we live out, the gospel we proclaim. This is our challenge, and this is our calling. May we all live into this calling, and may we nurture our lives of faith in community along the way. This is the blessing the church has to offer to her members and communities, if we are willing to receive. I look forward to seeing you on Sunday, and on every day in between!

CHRISTINE M. BELSCHES MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

Christine M. Belsches Memorial Scholarship fund was established in 2015 as a memorial to Christine M. Belsches to provide financial assistance for ongoing educational opportunities. Christine was a long time member of Gregory Memorial and very much valued furthering the education of her own children. Her son, Alan, stated "she skimped and saved so that we would be able to continue our education." The scholarship is a way to honor her memory, a tribute to his mother who struggled and worked hard to make sure he and his brother were able to go to college.

Eligible applicants include members of Gregory Memorial Presbyterian Church, children and grandchildren of members of Gregory, and friends of Gregory who are actively involved and engaged in our church.

Awards are determined by the applicant's needs, the number of applicants, and the amount available for distribution. Applications will be accepted from January to April for fall semester and awarded in June; and August to November for spring semester and awarded in January.

Recipients are not obligated to repay these scholarships. They are awarded in love as part of our Christian ministry. However, we encourage former recipients, as well as others to contribute to this fund. All gifts (memorials, etc.) would be invested as part of the principal; thus, the initial gift is perpetuated and interest only will be awarded.

If a person chooses to contribute to this fund or memorials are given to this fund, a notation on the check or in writing must accompany the check. All gifts and memorials will be acknowledged and parties involved will be notified.

ST. FRANCIS: After throwing away the leaves, they go out and buy something which they call mulch. They haul it home and spread it around in place of the leaves.


GOD: And where do they get this mulch?


