Dear Saints and Friends of Gregory Memorial,



"Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out...The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly. I am the good shepherd..."

-John 10:1-3, 10-11a

hen I was growing up I could often be found at my friend's house, especially during the summer months. There was a group of us, all around the same age, that lived within a one-block radius of my friend, so it was naturally a central point for all of us to gather at his house (which I'm sure made his parents thrilled!). While we would often congregate at his house, we would just as often move from there to another friend's house within that block, and to get to one of them meant cutting through a fenced-in backyard.

Now, no one lived there, so I guess no one ever really cared that we cut through "their" yard, but every time I hopped the fence and made my way to the other side I felt like I was doing something illicit. I felt like I wasn't supposed to be there, and that I was transgressing a boundary I wasn't supposed to cross. (Just imagine a group of teenage boys "stealthily" moving along a fenceline in the middle of the afternoon, trying to look inconspicuous).

And this is, perhaps, what Jesus was referring to as he spoke to the disciples, immediately following a confrontation with the Pharisees in which he was accused of transgressing the bounds of acceptable behavior (he was "guilty" of providing sight to a man born blind). Whereas the thief who sneaks into the sheepfold by going over the fence goes in with lifestealing motives, Jesus (even though he is accused of breaking the social 'fence') has come to bring life, and life abundant...rich life...life full to overflowing.

Have you ever been guilty of crossing a line, a fence or boundary, which you shouldn't have? Did you go somewhere that you knew you shouldn't have gone, or by a way which was out of bounds? In many ways, we all have; if not physically in our actions, we are fully aware that we do not always live as we are called to live, have not followed God's commands the way we ought.

It might begin to sound like a sticky dynamic, whether or not one ought to cross the fence, to step over the boundary of what is acceptable and what isn't, until we reframe the question in terms of what Jesus is proclaiming and offering. Are we attempting something with the purpose of taking life (or diminishing life), whether it be of ourselves, of another, or of society? Or are we attempting to increase life, and meaning within life, by offering to others out of the abundance which we have received?

We have been called into the life of discipleship for two purposes: to increase our own life of faith (living into the New Life offered in Christ), and to increase the lives of others in society. Christ came into the world, acting in ways that sometimes put him at odds with the understood and acceptable ways of society, for the sole purpose of bringing new life, rich and abundant life, to the world. It is our calling to live into this offering and help others to do the same.

Over the next few weeks of Lent, we'll be exploring how we walk this path toward Life, the Life Christ offers through his death and resurrection. We'll talk about how we walk this path, what we encounter, and how we support others in their own journeys. And together, we'll come to the Cross, to the Tomb, and finally to the Empty Tomb. I pray you'll join us in this journey; we begin on Wednesday, March 1, for our Ash Wednesday service (7:00 p.m.).

HOLY HUMOR
