Dear Saints and Friends of Gregory Memorial,



"Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received. Whoever speaks must do so as one speaking the very words of God; whoever serves must do so with the strength that God supplies, so that God may be glorified in all things through Jesus Christ. To him belong the glory and the power forever and ever. Amen."

-1 Peter 4:10-11

Trivia question: What is the topic which Jesus spends the most time talking about in our scriptures? Would you say it's living a life of

discipleship? Indirectly. How to love your neighbor as yourself, and love God before all others. In a roundabout way. But in actuality, a large portion of Jesus' teachings have to do with money, possessions, and how we use them (namely, stewardship). A quick Google search has multiple sources confirming this, that nearly 16 of Jesus' parables address this topic, and that in the gospel accounts alone there are about 288 verses regarding money/possessions, and in the whole of the Bible there are over 2,000!

Does this mean that Jesus is more interested in our bank accounts than he is in our hearts and the way we live our faith? No...and yes.

While there are indeed many good pearls of advice on how to manage our finances and resources, most of these verses and parables talk not simply about what to do with them, but rather, how we approach them, how we use them, and to what end. The "too long/didn't read" version is this: don't serve your treasures (bank accounts), let your treasures enable you to serve God and proclaim the Good News. This act of stewardship – the spirit in which we approach our money and possessions for use in the world – is not simply a way of guiding our decisions…not simply collecting pledges on a Sunday morning or making the annual budget. It so much more. Stewardship is the reflection of our relationship with God.

So, no, Jesus is not simply interested in our bank accounts. I don't think he determines our value based on whether we are millionaires or barely make ends need; he loves us all, regardless. I don't think he's hooked on whether or not we have the best interest rate on your savings account, or even if we have a savings account. I do think he's interested in whether or not our use and stewardship of these resources – financial and material – are being used in the best way to promote the goodness of God, and the attitude we have to this end.

Money tends to be one of the taboo topics in society today, at least in terms of personal finances. We don't go around asking each other what we make, or what we have, though we certainly feel as we can gauge that based on what we show to the world: our houses, our cars, our vacations. And my goal is neither to ask you how your bank account looks, nor guilt you for any way in which you use those resources. My goal is simply this: to remind us (myself included) that all good gifts we have received come from God, and that the ways in which we use these gifts reflect our relationship with God.

And this is precisely what we will be discussing during the month of July: the ways in which the stewardship of the gifts we have received reflects (and deepens) our relationship with God. In this is our true calling, in this is the fullness of discipleship: that we offer every aspect of our lives in gratitude and humility to God's use. And in this is Jesus concerned, so much so that many of his parables and teachings focused on this very topic. May we indeed be good stewards of the gifts we have received, and glorify God with each and every gift.
