

A Service of Hope on the Darkest Night

December 21, 2017, 7:00 p.m.

<u>Gathering</u> One: Tonight, we gather here in this place of refuge,

All: For we are lost, we are lonely, we are afraid.

One: Tonight, we gather daring to wonder if God has indeed come in Jesus,

All: Discerning the rejection we have known, intimate with our failed relationships, holding our heartaches in hands of tenderness.

One: Tonight, we gather just as we are,

All: For God has promised to meet us here and welcome us for who we are.

One: This first candle we light to remember those whom we love and have lost. We pause to remember their names, their faces, their voices, the memory that binds them to us in this season.

All: May God's eternal love surround them. (pause)

One: This second candle we light to redeem the pain of loss; the loss of relationships, the loss of jobs, the loss of health. We pause to gather up the pain of the past and offer it to God, asking that from God's hands we receive the gift of peace.

All: Refresh, restore, renew us O God, and lead us into your future. (*pause*)

One: This third candle we light to remember ourselves in this Advent and Christmas season. We pause and remember these past weeks and months; the disbelief, the anger, the downtimes, the poignancy of remembering, the warmth of family and friends, all who have stood with us. We give thanks for the support we have known.

All: Let us remember that dawn defeats darkness. (pause)

One: This fourth candle is lit to remember our faith and the gift of hope which the Christmas story offers us. We remember that God, who shares our life, promises for us a time and place of no more pain or suffering.

All: Let us remember the one who shows us the way, who brings the truth and who bears the life. *(pause)*
