

y legs were a constant ache, while my feet felt as if they were gaining two pounds with every step, making each one harder than the one before. With the summit in view, however, my excitement for the view from the top – as well as the promise of stopping the hike to rest! – kept me going forward, step after heavy step. It wasn't a long hike; no more than a mile and a half, but at a steady incline the entire way my legs were close to jelly by the time we reached the highest peak in Shenandoah Park: Hawksbill Summit. And as tired as our legs were, as sore as our feet would be, as out of breath as our lungs were, the view of the entire Shenandoah Valley opening up below us was well worth the hike, and the pain.

We might use terms to describe such a view as breathtaking, amazing, awe-inspiring, or simply beautiful. When coupled with the afternoon we were there, when the wind was a steady roar in our ears and the conversations of anyone else were drowned out, making you feel as if you and you alone were standing there, you could even say it was transcendent or, dare I say, religious. When you realize that, no matter what or who else is there, it feels like it is simply you in the presence of God with no other distractions and a reminder of the grandeur and spectacle of the Divine, the word we're actually looking for is *liminal*.

Liminal refers to the threshold space between one area and another. When you open the door and cross over into the house from the outside, you are passing through the liminal space between the outside world and inside your home. When you are walking in the shadow of a building or trees, and pass into the open sunny area, you are moving through the liminal space between dark and light. Just as liminal space is physical in terms of the space around us, so too is it mental and emotional – for instance,

when you sit down to write a grocery list your mind is moving through the liminal state from being focused on one thing to now being focused on a grocery list. Any time a threshold is passed through – physical, mental, emotional – you are moving through liminal space.

The same goes with spiritual. In theological terms, the liminal space could be described as the space that exists between the Divine and the Mortal, between God and humanity. Sometimes, there seems to be great chasm of a threshold, and thus, the liminal space is vast. But at other times, when it seems that you are caught up in the very presence and intimate nearness of God – such as standing on the summit of Hawksbill Peak – that liminal space is very *thin*, almost non-existent.

These "thin spaces" – where there is little to no liminal space between us and God – are what we yearn for in our spirits. My hope and prayer is that worship on Sunday morning is something of a "thin space," and I would imagine that other places and times in your lives have been thin, as well – the laughter of child or grandchild or the embrace of a loved one, for example. This is what worship is meant to be: the narrowing of the distance between us and God so that we might, in God's intimate presence, be more of who we were created and called to be, that we might be, more fully, our true selves. And in Christ, the One who has bridged the distance between Divine and Mortal in his very life and being, we are indeed given this opportunity each week, each day.

Where do you find your "thin spaces?" What would it take to make worship at Gregory Memorial more of a thin space for you or others?
