

I've always disliked going to the eye doctor. I have nothing against what they do (in fact, I greatly appreciate it), and I truly enjoy being able to see clearly, so I'm grateful for their help in that area. But I've never enjoyed the examination part of the annual visit, and it has nothing to do with people working around my eyes. Rather, whenever I'm in the exam and I'm being asked to read a line, or which is better (Option A, or Option

B), I always feel as if the answer I give is not the answer they expected. I can almost hear in their voice an unspoken, "Really, you think that line contains those letters? Or that Option is the better one? Your eyes are far worse than anticipated!" It just always feels like I'm giving the wrong answer, and that my vision is incorrect...that I'm not actually seeing what I think I'm seeing.

More than likely, however, is the reality that while I am honestly stating what I think I see, my vision is not that bad, and it really only needs some minor correction. It's only in my mind that I think I'm not giving the 'right' answers, and it's important to recognize that distinction, as it speaks more to whether or not I trust in the vision that is before me, and less to my physical capabilities. Regardless, it is good to regularly check one's vision and make sure that it is focusing correctly. And this is true for Christ's Church just as much as it is for Christ's disciples.

Gregory Memorial is at a point that we are checking and potentially refocusing our vision. Your session and I are now in the process of revisiting our mission & vision, discerning together whether they are still aligned with the capabilities and gifts of the congregation and, more

importantly, that they are still aligned with the overall vision that we have received from Christ: the Good News of the Abundant Life of the Kingdom of God. Using exercises found in *The Path: Creating Your Mission Statement for Work and for Life* (Jones, 1998), we are prayerfully discussing and discerning how Gregory Memorial lives out the Kingdom of God in our own unique and particular way here in Prince George. Our first such discussion was this past month, and it brought about wonderful conversation! Suffice to say, I believe we have set ourselves on a good trajectory as we look to our congregation's future.

I cannot say, necessarily, where it will lead us, but I do believe in the process and have faith that the vision we are brought to will be one that we can trust in, and will be one which comes from God. The real question, then, will be: do we, as a congregation, have what it takes to follow where this renewed vision is leading us? Again, time will tell, but I continue to have faith in our congregation and its resolve.

It is appropriate that we are taking up this work now, as we enter into the season of Lent. Lent has always been about preparation, about taking stock of one's self and passions, one's abilities and even one's fears & weaknesses. Christ, tempted in the desert, faced difficult decisions (and came through them to the other side, better off and more prepared for the ministry he was about to undertake). We, too, may face such trials in this season of Lent, and like our Lord, we can come out the other end prepared for what we are called to do, prepared to bear witness not only to the crucifixion but also to the resurrection. It is on this that we ultimately fix our vision; it is of this that we ultimately proclaim and live out. May our vision be blessed, indeed, and may this season of Lent be a true gift.
