

"It's unfamiliar, and yet familiar at the same time."

people were gathered with me in the Sanctuary for the first time since early March (though masked and 6 feet apart), I asked for feedback on what they thought of the service, how it went, what it was like to be gathered in such a way and whether we should continue in this format for the time being. The phrase above, offered in response to my question, is (I think) the best overall summation of this step in our grand work of ministry in a pandemic.

Certainly, it is unfamiliar, still. Even after months of living this way, it is unfamiliar; I don't know that it will ever feel familiar and normal, nor should it. Though this world is just our temporary home as we dream of the Kingdom of God to which we truly belong, that does not mean that we should accept as normal such diminished living as a pandemic or systemic injustice. As such, this is all still unfamiliar – communicating with one another while wearing a mask, so that we take measures to not spread any germs we may have (whether or not we know we have them); reading verses of well-known hymns without singing them; sitting separated from the members of our church family, and not greeting them with the warm hugs and handshakes which come so naturally to us...all of this is unfamiliar, and demands more of us than we are used to giving.

As unfamiliar as it is, though, there are signs and echoes of the familiar, of the certain and unshakeable. Namely, the love and presence of Christ, the work of the Spirit, the sovereign reality of God. And in the light of such familiar and unshakeable truths, we can venture boldly into the unfamiliar.

In the sermon of that same Sunday, as we discussed dreaming and visioning in the will of God, I quoted two individuals who have done extensive work on guiding congregations in times of unfamiliarity and uncertainty: George Barna and Bob Logan. Both spoke of how seeking and living into the vision of God draws us out of status quo (the comfortable and familiar) and into risky experiments. On the surface, such a calling could seem off-putting, but when we pause to reflect on this Biblically, we remember that God has been doing this kind of risky experimentation and exploration throughout all of history, and with phenomenal results!

From calling an unknown old man from his homeland to a new place and promising generations as his inheritance, to guiding the people of covenant into the wilderness on the heels of a stuttering and insecure leader, to restoring a people from exile, to converting a persecutor of the faith to staunch evangelism...from sending a chosen prophet into the belly of a great fish to inviting a dedicated follower to walk on the waves...from providing sustenance in the wilderness to multiplying fish and loaves beyond imagination to feed multitudes...in and throughout all of this God has done unexpected, risky, and decidedly non-status quo things to show forth the Kingdom of Heaven and remind the people of what is truly important and necessary. And these examples don't even touch yet on the resurrection of Jesus in a great reframing of the world as it was known!

No, we should not be surprised to find ourselves in the midst of doing a new thing, an unfamiliar and even uncomfortable thing; the truth is still that there is familiarity in this, too. And undergirding it all is the familiar and unshakeable presence of the Divine, the love of Christ which never fails. In this truth, let us venture boldly forward into the future. Trust me, God is already there, beckoning us onward.

- ~ If you are experiencing fever or other symptoms/illness, please stay home and worship with us virtually.
- ~ If you feel comfortable doing so, you may join us in person with the following considerations:
 - Cloth masks are still in effect for public spaces. If you plan to join us in person, please join us as well in wearing a mask for the health of us all.
 - Please make liberal use of the hand sanitizer placed at each entrance to the Sanctuary.
 - Family units are asked to keep physical distance of 6 feet. Pews are marked off for this.
 - Worship information will be available on the weekly "bulletin" handout. This will also be available digitally on the church website for those who wish to worship from home.

Above all and through all, remember this: Jesus loves you and loves us; we are not abandoned; this will last some time but is still temporary in the grand scheme of life; the more we do our part the quicker we will be on the other side of it.
