I can still see their faces. Likely, you can, too. The faces of loved ones who have entered into the fullness of the kingdom - our siblings, parents, grandparents, friends - gathered in the sanctuary where they always used to sit. As I picture every congregation I have ever been a part of, I can still see the faces of these loved ones sitting in their usual spot.

Yesterday was the annual celebration of All Saints Day in the Christian Church, the day when we mark the lives of faith of those who have gone before us, and whose witness upholds us. I think back on several of these people: Rod Wells, Joanne Wehmeyer, Esther Bink, Chet Cashing, Jane Jencks, and many, many more. Their love, their guidance still upholds me, still directs me. And, in their warm and loving smile, they continue to invite me to be better, and to do more good.
