Dear Saints and Friends of Gregory Memorial,



"In your steadfast love you led the people whom you redeemed; you guided them by your strength to your holy abode." ~ *Exodus 15:13* 

"May the Lord direct your hearts to the love of God and to the steadfastness of Christ." ~ 2 Thessalonians 3:5

A fter college, when I was first living for the year in Petersburg, Alaska, (and then Montana and then Texas), my mother started a practice of shellacking some of the leaves that had changed color and fallen (to help preserve them) and then send them on to me. Every fall I began to look forward to a small, lightweight package that contained a bit of "home" to remind me of the changing seasons and the beauty of my memories.

It is said anecdotally that the only constant in our world is change (and sometimes included in this are death and taxes). Often, we humans have a tendency to resist change and push back against it; we are naturally hard-wired to seek comfort and consistency, both of which rail against the prospect of change. Even when it is beneficial, change is often looked at with suspicion. And yet change is written into the fabric of creation. Leaves change colors and fall from trees as they prepare for winter, while at the same time those same leaves then provide mulch, protection, and nourishment to the ground below during that same winter season. They very creation around is designed for change, for growth and development.

(It should be noted that, in some ways, change indeed is not a beneficial reality. There are certainly aspects of change and realities where this is not an aspect of development and growth.)

And while change is evident around us, whether we desire it and welcome it or not, there is a balance to this reality: there is One we know who is steadfast. This does not always mean the same as unable to develop, but in steadfastness we know God to be present, caring, loving, and faithful. These things hold true, and our scriptures speak to them repeatedly.

In Exodus (as quoted above), Moses reflects on how God has been steadfast toward Israel, even when Israel was in slavery in Egypt. Similarly, the Psalms reflect upon God's steadfast nature over 100 times (which is an average of just under once per Psalm). The prophets then go on to reflect of God's steadfast nature another dozen-plus times. And Paul exhorts the people of the congregations to which he writes to remember the steadfast love and faithfulness of God in Christ.

Even in the midst of change and transition, the steadfast love of God remains consistent. Our faith heritage and scriptures attest to this, as do our own personal experiences. Even when the world seems to be spinning around us in change, this is a truth that we hold fast in our lives. May it be for the glory of God, and may we find joy in the beauty of the world around us, even as it changes.
