Dear Saints and Friends of Gregory Memorial,



"Trust in the Lord with all your heart; don't rely on your own intelligence. Know him in all your paths, and he will keep your ways straight." ~ Proverbs 3:5-6

It's hard for us to see God's vision for our lives, but if we trust in Him and have faith, He will guide us down the road that He's built especially for us. Judy Recher shares this account of their vacation experience in recent years:

"I never thought I'd be tempted, much less actually climb 140' up on log ladders at the tender age of 70! My husband and I were touring the Southwest and arrived at Bandelier National Monument, outside Santa Fe, New Mexico, 7 days after arriving in Las Vegas from Virginia. We had travelled through Arizona, the Sonoran Desert, visiting ruins, antiquated missions, etc. It was a hot day and after endless miles and 7 days of desert--waterless and treeless landscape—a nice shady trail beckoned to us. How truly refreshing it was to be walking that trail alongside babbling Frijoles Creek. I remember testing the coolness of the rushing water as we paused sitting on a rock to enjoy the moment. It was so peaceful with very few tourists to disturb the tranquility. Nor did we see wildlife of any kind.

After our brief interlude, we set off again. Before too long, a challenge presented itself in the form of a towering cliff which housed an ancient Native American ceremonial cave barely visible at 140 feet high from the canyon floor. We had seen many cliffs with their ancient dwelling places carved into them along the way, but this cliff was most intriguing to me. The information sign described the trail that could be climbed to reach the cave. Can I do this? Oh, sure! Not letting my senior status be a stumbling block and knowing I would not be passing this way again, I took up the challenge! My husband, being acrophobic, chose to the photographer from below. (Oh well, pictorial documentation is important!)

Winding my way along on narrow, rocky ledges from one log ladder to the next, my senior bones carried me upward. The encouragement I receiving from other climbers (nowhere near my age!) reassured me that reaching the top was really worth the effort and helped me along. Later I wondered what lunacy consumed me to do this, but I did not want to admit defeat, although it was strongly considered. Now, I wish that I had counted how many ladders there were---just way too many! Finally, I made it to a small plateau; just one more long ladder leading into the cave. The panoramic view was breathtaking. The few people below looked like ants. I tried to identify my husband, but could not. He had gone back into the trees and shade. A minute of sanity engulfed me as I thought I should turn around and go down, until a group of young people descended from that last ladder and urged me on, saying that since I made it this far, I really ought to climb to the cave. Hmm---easy for them to say. After pondering briefly, I decided they were right. After this climb, what's another 20'? So upward, I go! And yes, reaching the summit, so to speak, and settling into my lofty aerie in the cave was truly an exhilarating experience 140' (14 stories) above the canyon floor, not to mention how proud I felt over my accomplishment. The cave itself would easily hold 100 people more or less, and as I recall, was probably 10-15' in height. There was a couple having picnic lunch in one corner. (I think I might have had indigestion doing that!) I wonder if any thought was given to the return trip? Then, as I sat looking out from the cave entry, suddenly the reality of the moment struck me like a lead balloon---I had to go back down! Panic engulfed me---a totally new experience for me. Trying to reassure myself that I could and HAD to do it wasn't convincing me. I prayed to God to give me the strength and courage to safely descend those ladders. Trusting in my faith, knowing that prolonging the inevitable was not going to help, I slowly walked to the first of many ladders, now more difficult this time (they had to be backed into by crawling backwards because the rails were on ground level and difficult to grab onto. I fumbled around with my foot, searching for find that first rung. I dared not look down at my destination. Not meeting any people for encouragement did not help me either. I felt so alone.

Needless to say, having my feet hit solid ground and falling into my husband's arms was utter relief as well as an amazing leap of faith, knowing that I made it only with God's help. I think I aged several years, adding more grey hairs but I DID IT! I still wonder now what possessed me to do this, and I have to look at our pictures sometimes to assure myself that it happened.

Later that day, we learned that others had experienced the same fears as I had in the cave and had to be rescued My question is why the Native Americans would select such an inaccessible location so difficult to reach? Did they have ladders? We will never know. I doubt that they were concerned about any enemies interrupting their rituals up there. Despite practically crawling backwards down the trail due to fatigued muscles and several more days of muscle fatigue, I don' regret my climb. But I do know that was my first and last one ever! No more grandiose ideas like that for me ever again!

Challenges, yes, but I will keep those within reason. Seniors must be mindful that mind is often more willing than body. My pride says "yes" but my body says "no." But we do need everyday challenges to keep us happy and mentally healthy."

GREETINGS SAINTS AND FRIENDS OF GREGORY MEMORIAL!

Your Session has been diligent in faithfully assessing how we continue to worship and move forward, and now especially, in light of the updated guidelines and proclamations from both CDC and local and federal leaders. Please note the following:

IF YOU ARE FULLY VACCINATED,


