Dear Saints and Friends of Gregory Memorial,

WHAT DOES LENT MEAN TO US?

We are entering the Season of Lent, a time of prayer, fasting and self-examination in preparation for the celebration of the resurrection of the Lord at Easter.

About Lent. Coming after the warm, fuzziness of Christmas, Lent is a difficult, intense season that confronts us with some really scary truths: the reality of change, the inevitability of loss, and the paradox that life and death are bound together. Try as we might, we cannot get away from these truths. They are part of us and our being human. With its themes of sacrifice and self-emptying, and its determined, unwavering march of events toward the cross and the suffering and death of Jesus, Lent has the potential to be particularly confusing and frightening. As adults, we may have figured out that these fearful realities ultimately serve a life-giving purpose. We can't have new life without death or transformation without change. So we carve out time and space in which we to ponder the meaning of these things.

As scary as Lent seems, there is still something that's essentially positive about it: *It is a time for cleansing, renewal, healing, and transformation.* At its heart, Lent is about the ritualistic getting rid of what we don't need—the things that don't really help us (some give up chocolate for Lent, for instance!)—so that there is space for growth and change and new life.

One of the defining stories of the Lenten season is of Jesus in the Wilderness. He goes out alone into the desert, seeking out a still place to listen and wonder about his own identity and the way he needs to go. The path he chooses is defined by making space. Once there, Jesus makes room and stretches the limits of who is welcome there. He does not cling to possessions or power or prestige or even to life; rather he empties himself to make room for something new— something better. No matter how young or old we are, we can all make more room in our lives for God to come in and do new things. This is good news!

When we think about Jesus coming into the world, what comes to mind first is usually the stories we tell about his birth with our imaginations full of images of shepherds, angels, magi, stars and a newborn sound asleep in a manger. But the Bible has other ways to talk about the coming of Jesus. "In the beginning..." That's how the

writer of the Gospel of John starts his story about Jesus. And he doesn't mean "when Jesus was a baby" or even "when Jesus was just starting out to do his work." No, he means the *very beginning*—the beginning of space and time. Maybe the writer of the Gospel was remembering the very first words in the Bible:

"In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters. And God said, 'Let there be light,' and there was light."

But listen to how John starts *his* story about Jesus:

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people."

If this sounds strange or hard to understand, think about it this way: Imagine you have a really great idea. The idea comes from you and is part of you, but if it is going to become something—to do something—it has to leave your mind and go out into the world. That's what John says happened with the Word—"God's Great Idea." The Word helped bring everything into being. But then, says John, the Word became flesh—a real human being. That's when the story about the Word becomes the story of Jesus. In other words, the life of Jesus—everything he said and did—is part of a much bigger and older story, a story so mysterious and wonderful that we need poetry to help us tell it. This is a story big enough to include everything and everyone—including you. Because the Light that was in Jesus is in you too!

So, if you ever feel small or unimportant, remember this:

When God made light, a universe lit up, a dazzling display of big, shiny stuff. And all that light— every bright golden hue is the very same light that God put inside you.


