To the Saints and Friends of Gregory Memorial:

CHRISTMASTIDE, TWELFTH NIGHT & EPIPHANY: (EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW & (MAYBE) WERE AFRAID TO ASK)

Let's start with "Christmastide." In Western Christianity, the Christmas season is traditionally synonymous with "Christmastide", which runs from December 25 (Christmas Day) to Epiphany January 5 or 6, explained below, ("Twelfth Night" or "Epiphany Eve"), a time popularly known as "The 12 Days of Christmas" and ending with celebration of the Feast of the Three Kings.

The Oxford English Dictionary defines the Twelfth Night as "the evening of January 5, the day before Epiphany, which traditionally marks the end of Christmas celebrations."

No doubt you are familiar with an English Christmas folk carol written by Fredrick Austin and published in 1780 entitled, "The Twelve Days of Christmas" that commemorated the Christmas tradition of celebrating the 12-day period between Christmas and Epiphany in Dickensian England. The carol soon became popular in England, and its popularity extended into Canada and the United States.

➤ What is Twelfth Day? The day preceding Epiphany is called "Twelfth Day." The evening before Epiphany is marked as "Twelfth Night", which falls either on January 5 or January 6, depending upon the Christian traditions and the starting point used for counting the Twelve Days of Christmas.

The time between December 25 and January 5/6 is known as the Twelve Days of Christmas.

- ➤ **About Twelfth Night.** Twelfth Night in 2024 will fall on Saturday, January 6, assuming that we follow the analysis of Professor Nick Groom. He is associated with the English Department of the University of Exeter (England) who, through extensive research, has concluded that (in his words): "Twelfth Night is Twelfth Day's Eve; we still talk about Christmas Eve as being Christmas Night."
- And Epiphany? The Christmas Season officially ends with the Day of Epiphany, the day noting the visit of the wise men ("Magi") to the infant/toddler Jesus in

Bethlehem. This day is celebrated as the "manifestation" of Christ, often described as being associated with light, particularly the light of the star that guided the wise men to Jesus' location.

Other terms for Epiphany are: Theophany, Feast of Epiphany, and Three Kings' Day, depending on the prevailing tradition, and how Epiphany (or "Feast Day") is celebrated worldwide depends on cultural beliefs, traditions, and the churches they follow. Epiphany in many countries is marked by the baking of special pastries and children receive small gifts in their shoes in honor of the Magi's gifts to the infant Jesus. Many traditions also include water as a reflection of Jesus' baptism, and the blessing of houses with holy water.

> So, why such emphasis on removing Christmas decorations on the Twelfth Day? It is believed that Christmas trees and decorations should be put away by the Twelfth Day to avoid bad luck. We can thank the Victorians and the Industrial Revolution of Great Britain for this. During the reign of Queen Victoria (of German heritage) it was the ambitious Victorians who decided that all Christmas decorations should be put aside after 12 days because they wanted to "get everybody to work", giving rise to "Boxing Day" on December 26 in Great Britain, the day after Christmas. Many believe that "Boxing Day" is the "First Day" of The Twelve Days of Christmas and count forward, while others hold to the belief that Christmas Day is the "First Day." Regardless, in many countries, Epiphany is not only a day to eat well, but also is a day to "box up" all Christmas decorations.

So, there you have it---everything you wanted to know about these Christmas traditions, but were (maybe) afraid to ask!
