# EASTER IS OVER, NOW WHAT?

### Just as the grave couldn't hold the Lord of Life, neither could the calendar confine the events of Easter to just one Sunday.

While the lilies have wilted and the last of the chocolate bunnies have long been devoured, celebration of Easter doesn't end with Easter Day. The implications of the resurrection of the Son of God are far-reaching, touching every facet of humanity, launching the universe in a stunning new direction ("to boldly go where no man has gone before"<sup>1</sup>) — guided by the new creation in which the God Almighty/Holy Father reigns through his Son in the power of the Holy Spirit. From Easter, our world has received an everlasting King — Jesus Christ. And much like the grave could not hold the Lord of Life, neither could the mere calendar confine the events of Easter to just one Sunday.

In fact, the Church's own calendar refuses to allow us to simply move on by designating that the weeks **of** Easter" --- not **after** Easter---continue through 7 more Sundays, all the way to Pentecost. Moreover, with every Sunday thereafter, Good Friday and Easter are represented in a renewal of humanity ("the baptized") through the symbolic feasting on the resurrected body and blood of God's sacrificed Lamb. Thus, in every Holy Communion Sunday, we are confronted by the font and Holy Absolution to bring us back to Holy Baptism, through which we were united in Christ's death and resurrection at the first Easter.

So there's a sense that even though Easter is over in terms of the anniversary of the resurrection of the Son of God, Easter continues still throughout the season, the year, all of life, and throughout all of time. And Christians are called to bask in that glow every day of their lives, as evidenced in the multiple New Testament descriptions of the resurrection impact on the lives of Christians as they consider *how to live in the present* and on to *what's in store for them in the future.* 

Simply put, the resurrection has upset the proverbial apple cart. Death has been defeated, and the Holy Spirit is being poured out onto the baptized, with the result being not only justification for those who rightly-condemned persons but also giving the promise of eternal life in the Spirit — a new way of being human, with the expectation that we will live in the here and now, like the future of a resurrected humanity.

That's what it means for the baptized to believe in "the God who raised Jesus from the dead and gave him glory," placing him in authority over all things, for us to have "faith and hope in God," as St. Peter says.

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled and unfading, kept in heaven for you, who are being protected by the power of God through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time." 1 Peter 1:3-5

*Truth be told, Easter ISN'T over: It's just the beginning of what's next. What else could we possibly need?*

### **CHURCH TRIVIA – PURPLE IN LENT**

Purple has been used in church history during Lent since the 12<sup>th</sup> century (pcusa.org). Merriam-Webster.com defines purple as any color midway between red and blue. In ancient Mediterranean, it was an expensive dye extracted from the mucus of Murex snails and could only be afforded by royalty and the church. According to Saint Johnpc.org, purple is a visual cue for deep spiritual reflection and symbolizes penance, repentance, and renewal. Purple reminds us of Christ's suffering as recorded in John 19:2 where a purple robe was placed on Him during his trial before his crucifixion. Healthyspirituality.org says "Purple invites us to slow down and reflect on Christ's sacrifice for His church." Purple represents God's power, majesty, and Christ's sacrifice on the cross. # **BE INSPIRED:** Is It Mothers Day? Or Mother's Day? Or Mothers' Day?

The story of Mother's Day goes back to 1858 in what is now a West Virginia community (a Virginia Community until 1863 when it joined the Union as a separate state), and it began with a problem: It had a terrible infant mortality rate, and a woman named Ann Reeves Jarvis wanted to do something about it.

Ann Jarvis organized "Mother's Day Work Clubs" in West Virginia to help mothers learn about hygiene and sanitation and how to care for their children. She understood a mother's loss, as she had 13 children of her own, but only 4 lived into adulthood. In addition to helping educate mothers in the area, she also worked to bring reconciliation after the Civil War ended. She had lost 5 of her children during the War, and in 1868, coordinated a "Mothers' Friendship Day" in West Virginia to bring former foes together. Veterans from both North and South wept and shook hands for the first time in years. She knew the powerful role mothers played, and wanted to see mothers celebrated for the work they did to improve the lives of others. "I hope and pray that someone, sometime, will found a memorial mothers' day commemorating her for the matchless service she renders to humanity in every field of life. She is entitled to it," Mrs. Jarvis said. When Ann Reeves Jarvis died in 1905, her daughter Anna, was determined to fulfill her mother's dream to celebrate mothers.

But Anna took a different approach. She wanted to celebrate her mother from her position as a devoted daughter using her motto for Mother's Day: "For the Best Mother Who Ever Lived – Your Mother." This was why the apostrophe went after the r in "Mother" – it was meant to be singular, not plural.

According to historian Katharine Antolini: "Anna envisioned the holiday as a homecoming, a day to honor **your** mother, the one woman who dedicated her life to **you**." The idea of celebrating the sacrifices a mother made was supported by others, and Anna's decision to celebrate on a Sunday made it appeal to churches as well. The first Mother's Day was celebrated in the Andrews Methodist Church in Grafton, West Virginia in 1908, 3 years after Anna Jarvis's mother died. Anna handed out hundreds of white carnations (her mother's favorite flower) to the mothers who attended. The date was intentional. Anna wanted Mother's Day to be celebrated on the second Sunday in May, making it always close to May 9, the day her mother had died.

And Anna was determined to see Mother's Day spread. She began a massive letter writing campaign to newspapers and prominent politicians, arguing that

American holidays were biased toward male achievements, and urged them to adopt a special day honoring motherhood. She also created a Mother's Day International Association and copyright-trademarked the phrases "Mother's Day" and "second Sunday in May." Her efforts were working, and in 1910, West Virginia made Mother's Day a state holiday.

And her idea quickly spread beyond West Virginia. In 1914, US President Woodrow Wilson designated Mother's Day as a national holiday, and agreed to Anna's preferred placement of the apostrophe in "Mother's Day", making it singular possessive, not plural possessive, so each family would honor its one and only mother. Mother's Day was embraced across the US, and also by Canada where it became a national holiday in 1915. But her joy was shortlived. Her vision for Mother's Day as a private acknowledgement for all the mother does for her family was eclipsed by commercial appeal very early on. When the price of carnations skyrocketed at Mother's Day, she issued a press release condemning florists. By 1920, she was urging people not to buy flowers at all when she saw businesses and charities using Mother's Day for their own purposes and when it was dragged into the debate over women's votes. She even accused First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt of "crafty plotting" for using Mother's Day in fundraising material for charities that addressed high maternal and infant mortality rates.

While many saw Mother's Day as an opportunity to make money, Anna never profited from Mother's Day, even though she could easily have done so. Instead, she used what money she had to fight the commercialization of Mother's Day, often with lawsuits over copyright infringement. In 1944 *Newsweek* claimed she had 33 pending lawsuits. Groups and companies purposely used the possessive plural spelling "Mothers' Day" to get around Anna's copyright!

Anna spent 9 years campaigning to make Mother's Day a national holiday, and then decades of her life trying to have the holiday rescinded. Anna never married or had children. In 1944, at age 80, the reclusive Anna was nearly blind, deaf and destitute, and was placed in a mental asylum in Philadelphia. She died four years later, and her obituary described her as a "lonely spinster."
